Yard Work Safety

Every spring, people from across the country abandon their winter hibernation to work in their yard. Yard work enhances the environment of your home and provides a way to get fresh air and exercise. However, there are hazards associated with yard work that you need to consider to ensure your safety. Below are a few tips on staying safe while working in your yard.

- Avoid wearing loose clothing or jewelry that could be caught in moving parts of lawn equipment like lawn mowers and electric trimmers.
- Wear appropriate footwear based on the terrain and tasks being performed.
- Eye and hearing protection may be needed at times, depending on what chore you are tackling.
- Gloves should be worn when pulling weeds or using equipment to avoid burns.
- It is best to pick up any objects in the yard, such as sticks, glass, rocks, or metal that could become a projectile if caught inside motorized lawn equipment.
- Make sure electrical tools are inspected and properly functioning. Be sure equipment such as trimmers are unplugged before making any adjustments.
- All equipment should function properly and all electrical cords should be in good condition. Any cords that are frayed should be replaced before use.
- It is important to watch for small children and keep them away from moving equipment. Never allow small children to operate or ride with you while operating equipment.
- You should not overexert yourself while doing yard work, especially on hot days. Stay hydrated during extremely warm weather to avoid heat exhaustion or heat stroke.
- NEVER reach into lawn equipment to remove debris while the equipment is in use.

E-mail Notices

E-mail is one of the best ways for friends and family to stay in touch, but what about employers? Many online job boards, like Indeed and CareerBuilder, utilize e-mail announcements for potential jobs. Lofton also uses email to communicate with our candidates. If you are not receiving emails from Lofton, or other potential employers, there may be a few reasons why.

SPAM FILTER. Your mail server may be blocking e-mails and marking them as spam. Be sure to check your spam folder and mark Lofton (and others) as an approved e-mail so you can stay on top of any announcements.

OLD E-MAIL ADDRESS. If you have changed your primary e-mail address, be sure to update your records with Lofton and other potential employers.

INCOMPLETE E-MAIL ADDRESS. Everyone is human, your e-mail address may have been entered into the system incorrectly. If you have not received any announcements, log into your Lofton account to verify your address, phone, etc.

MAILBOX FULL. Be sure to delete old messages from your inbox to keep your box below the limit. Don't forget to empty the Trash folder too. Too many emails in the Trash folder can slow down your phone and/or computer system.
